Storyboard

Below each drawing, provide a brief two to three sentence description of what is taking place in each scene. While planning your storyboard, be sure to conduct research on each Halifax Explosion scene so you can provide a detailed and accurate description. You should also familiarize yourself with any pictures associated with each scene so you can draw visuals that relate to and enhance the quality of the information you include. Arrange your storyboard scene sketches and descriptions in the proper order in which they occurred.
