Sovereign

"It was made up of five <u>sovereign</u> nations that had joined together as one larger group." Independent; having self-government.

Independence

"France, a former threat, would later help the colonies achieve independence."

Land speculator

"This went against the wishes of American <u>land</u> <u>speculators</u>, who wanted to own and then sell thousands of hectares of arable land in the Ohio Valley." The state of being self-governing and not under the authority of another country.

A person who buys and sells land for a profit.

Someone who imports and exports goods illegally.

Smuggler

"This meant that <u>smugglers</u>, who avoided taxes and other payments on imports, could make a handy profit."

Protest

"Some Boston merchants <u>protested</u> by refusing to buy British goods, but at the time the protest was fairly low key." A public demonstration of objection, often to a government policy.

Tar and feather

"Officials sent out to enforce the Stamp Act were often attacked. Some were <u>tarred and feathered</u>, a painful and humiliating experience." Covering a person with hot tar and feathers.

Repeal

"Few officials were brave enough to force people to use the stamps. The Act was a disaster, and everyone knew it. It was <u>repealed</u> in 1766."

To take back.

Sons of Liberty

"The <u>Sons of Liberty</u> were dedicated to resisting British taxes and trade restrictions, and were willing to resort to violence, including harassing British tax officers"

A political group of activists.

Patriot

"Led by colonial leaders, and... encouraged by the Sons of Liberty, which were organized groups of American <u>patriots</u>, people challenged the British government"

Intolerable Acts

"Parliament then passed a series of Acts that were meant to punish Boston and assert British authority. These became known as the <u>Intolerable Acts</u>." A person devoted to the interests of his or her country.

Acts passed by British parliament, considered by American colonists to violate their natural and constitutional rights.

Boycott

"Leaders demanded a <u>boycott</u> of goods from England, and began cutting economic ties to the home country." Refuse to buy goods from a particular source.
