Battle Plan for Quebec

Use the map outline of Quebec to design a battle plan for the capture or defence of Quebec City in 1759. You will need to label the defences and assets of the French and the British, and use arrows and written labels to explain how you would defend or attack Quebec. The French start by holding territory on the northwest side of the St. Lawrence River (like Quebec and the Coast of Beauport). The British start by controlling most of the river traffic, and hold Pointe Levis and Ile d`Orleans or Island of Orleans (southeast side of the river). Your map should be well-labelled (key or comments on the map) and follow correct mapping requirements (title, scale, etc.). Label the St. Lawrence and St. Charles Rivers, Pointe Levis, Island of Orleans, Coast of Beauport, and Falls of Montmorency. On a separate sheet of paper write a brief narrative about how the battle unfolds. Will Montcalm successfully defend Quebec, or will Wolfe crush the French? You decide!
