## Debate

Louis Riel, a man considered a hero by his people, was hanged on November 16<sup>th</sup> 1885, for high treason. Many years later, our class is revisiting this event. Why? - Because it is still controversial. You will experience the controversy during your debate, which will bring history to life - and your fresh eyes to the issues. Perhaps you will have something new to say. With a small group (of three to four students), choose one of the topics below and work cooperatively with your group members to direct a debate. While planning your debate, be sure to conduct research to determine what arguments and evidence (details, quotes, statistics etc.) support your point of view. Just as important, you should anticipate and research your opposition's counter-arguments in order to be prepared to provide a response. Everyone is responsible for researching, supporting, and defending their team's arguments and pointing out areas of disagreement with opposing groups. One final mark will be given to all group members.
