Adhere

"The flutes were shining black to brown, and only a few small barnacles <u>adhered</u> to the shell." To stick to something.

Bulwark

"It was at once property and source of food, for a man with a boat can guarantee a woman that she will eat something. It is the <u>bulwark</u> against starvation."

Canoe

"They were high and graceful <u>canoes</u> with curving bow and stern and a braced section midships where a mast could be stepped to carry a small lateen sail." something.

Something that provides protection for or against

A light narrow boat with pointed ends, propelled by a paddle or paddles.

Clarity

"So that sea and land had the sharp <u>clarities</u> and the vagueness of a dream."

The quality or state of being clear.

Deft

"Kino deftly slipped his knife into the edge of the shell."

Estuary

"The town lay on a broad <u>estuary</u>, its old yellow plastered buildings hugging the beach." The tidal mouth of a large river, where the tide meets the

Neatly skillful and quick in one's movements.

stream.

Gloat

"And to Kino the secret melody of the maybe pearl broke clear and beautiful, rich and warm and lovely, glowing and <u>gloating</u> and triumphant." To show in an improper way that you are happy with your own success or another's misfortune.

Illusion

"What he had seen, he knew, might be a reflection, a piece of flat shell accidently drifted in or a complete <u>illusion</u>." A thing that is or is likely to be wrongly perceived or interpreted by the senses.

Incandescence

"Kino lifted the flesh, and there it lay, the great pearl, perfect as the moon. It captured the light and refined it and gave it back in silver <u>incandescence</u>." The steady giving off of the form of radiation that makes vision possible.

Irritate

"An accident could happen to these oysters, a grain of sand could lie in the folds of muscle and <u>irritate</u> the flesh until... it coated the grain with a layer of smooth cement."

Make (someone) annoyed, impatient, or angry.

Mangrove

"Across the estuary from the town one section of <u>mangroves</u> stood clear and telescopically defined, while another mangrove clump was a hazy black-green blob."

A tree or shrub that grows in chiefly tropical coastal swamps that are flooded at high tide.

Mirage

"Although the morning was young, the hazy mirage was up." Something that comes from or exists only in the mind and is not real.

Obscure

"Kino moved cautiously so that the water would not be obscured with mud or sand." Having an often intentionally veiled or uncertain meaning.

Perceptible

"But in the song there was a secret little inner song, hardly <u>perceptible</u>, but always there... and this was the Song of the Pearl That Might Be" (Especially of a slight movement or change of state) able to be seen or noticed.

Poultice

"She gathered some brown seaweed and made a flat damp <u>poultice</u> of it, and this she applied to the baby's swollen shoulder, which was as good a remedy as any"

A medicated covering used to heal an injury.

Recede

"In the pale light he could see the little waves break over her, and her skirt floated about and clung to her legs as the water <u>receded</u>." Go or move back or further away from a previous position.

Remedy

"She gathered some brown seaweed and made a flat damp poultice of it, and this she applied to the baby's swollen shoulder, which was as good a <u>remedy</u> as any"

A medicine or treatment for a disease or injury.

Shrill

"His heart beat out a heavy rhythm and the melody of the maybe pearl <u>shrilled</u> in his ears."

Strew

"Light filtered down through the water to the bed where the frilly pearl oysters lay fastened to the rubbly bottom, a bottom <u>strewn</u> with shells of broken, opened oysters."

Subside

"He worked the blade lever-wise and the closing muscle parted and the shell fell apart. The lip-like flesh writhed up and then <u>subsided</u>."

Tact

"It is not good to want a thing too much. It sometimes drives the luck away. You must want it just enough, and you must be very <u>tactful</u> with God or the gods."

Scatter or spread (things) untidily over a surface or area.

(Of a voice or sound) high-pitched and piercing.

The ability to deal with others in touchy situations without offending them.

Become less intense, violent, or severe.

Undulate

"Above, the surface of the water was an <u>undulating</u> mirror of brightness, and he could see the bottoms of the canoes sticking through it."

To move or be shaped like waves.

Vague

"So that sea and land had the sharp clarities and the vagueness of a dream."

Of uncertain, indefinite, or unclear character or meaning.

Writhe

"He worked the blade lever-wise and the closing muscle parted and the shell fell apart. The lip-like flesh <u>writhed</u> up and then subsided." Make continual twisting, squirming movements or contortions of the body.
